Garden Checklist FEBRUARY 2016 - MARCH 2016

FEBRUARY

THIRD WEEK:

The brown foliage on pampas grass and maiden grass can be pruned away now. Leave only a "crew cut" of brown stems twelve inches high.

Plant sweet pea now for fragrant flowers later. Plant English peas, onions, asparagus or elephant garlic for your spring vegetable garden.

Overgrown Burford holly shrubs can be pruned severely now. Even if it is reduced to twelve inches tall, this shrub will resprout plenty of new foliage by summer.

Plant a large container for your patio. A small boxwood surrounded by variegated ivy and blooming pansies would look very nice!

Plant a winter daphne (*Daphne odorum*) near your home's entrance or front walkway. The scent will greet you each day when you arrive at your abode this spring.

FOURTH WEEK:

Clean out bird boxes so they will be ready to welcome new residents in a few weeks.

Build raised beds for vegetables, roses and herbs. It's easy to do with four pieces of 2×8 wood planks. Choose lengths that fit your space; bolt them together at the corners.

Reduce the size of your butterfly bush by two thirds to one half to encourage new growth (and big blooms) this summer.

Time for the first fertilization of fescue for the year. Any brand of turf fertilizer will work well. Next application: April.

Set your mower to its highest setting and cut off the tattered leaves of liriope (monkey grass). They will quickly regrow in March.

MARCH

FIRST WEEK:

Fertilize pansies. Since the soil is warming, use any water soluble houseplant fertilizer, one half pint to one pint of solution per plant.

Cut most of the green foliage off of tattered liriope. A mower, set to its highest setting, is the best tool for large areas.

If you haven't spread lime on your lawn in a year, it's time once again. Use 40 pounds per 1000 square feet.

Start seed of tomatoes and annual flowers indoors. You'll need six weeks to grow strong transplants.

SECOND WEEK:

Prune boxwood – but not with shears. Use a hand pruner to make foliage "holes" in the greenery so light can penetrate to the trunk.

Spray a fungicide (Captan, etc.) on apple and peach trees while the blooms are on the tree.

Now is the time to prune giant holly shrubs back to a manageable size. Don't be shy – you can cut them to eighteen inches tall and they will come back.

Plant bare-root roses in soil that contains plenty of organic matter and which has been thoroughly tilled.

Monthly Recipe Box

This month's recipe was provided by Phyllis King

BROWN BAG APPLE PIE

1 unbaked pie shell (9inch)

8 large apples (I use Granny Smith) ½ cup sugar

2 TBS flour

½ tsp nutmeg

½ tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp allspice

2 TBS lemon juice

TOPPING

½ cup sugar

½ cup flour

½ cup butter

½ cup chopped pecans (optional)

Chunk apples to make 7 cups. (I do not peel; just wash and dry.) Mix flour, sugar and spices; then combine with apple chunks. Place in pie shell and sprinkle with lemon juice. For topping, combine sugar and flour; cut in butter. (Works better if butter is room temp.) Crumble topping mixture over pie. Place pie in brown paper bag and place on cookie sheet. Bake 1 hour at 400-425 degrees.

This recipe was submitted by my sister-in-law, Rhonda Fort to the Frankfort Younger Woman's Club; this club published some of the best cookbooks ever. I adopted this recipe and have made this pie at least once a year since the 70's.



Finding Interest in the Winter Garden

Q. Like many gardeners, I find winter difficult when I look outside and see a dull landscape; are there some plants that add color, beauty, and interest to my boring brown garden?

A. First, take some cheer in the fact that there are only 54 days until the vernal equinox occurs on Sunday, March 20th at 12:31 am. Spring will happen! In the meantime there are a few things you can do to add color. You can enjoy an immediate boost by planting some pansies or violas, *Viola wittrockiana*. The best time to plant pansies is actually October, but you can do so now by choosing a protected area when the ground is not frozen. After planting, the plants should be watered in with a liquid fertilizer, and you should follow up by fertilizing at least once a month. It has been warmer this year than some winters, but if freezing occurs the plants will show some stress. However, pansies and violas will usually snap back when it warms up. Remember these plants are annuals and have to be replaced each year.

Another thing you can do is to attend the Carroll County Master Gardener program on February 11th; James Hembree, a horticultural expert, will be speaking about creating interest in the winter garden. James will be speaking about 25-30 winter bloomers; he will be acquainting the group about some favorites and some unusual winter bloomers.

A well-loved favorite is the Lenten rose or *Helleborus orientalis*, and unlike the pansies, hellebores are perennials and should be an item in your garden for many years. This plant will require some time to produce blooms, however, because it grows so slowly. In spite of the slow growth, the hellebore is prolific in producing offspring. Not all nurseries have the plant for sale, and it is a bit pricy. However, it will reward you with many babies which can grow near the parent plants or be transplanted to another area in your garden. It is also forgiving and flexible in environmental conditions; it will flourish in our red clay with only an annual application of a balanced fertilizer. Hellebores need some sun but love the afternoon shade. As in most beds, hellebores need mulching, but it is important not to cover too deeply because the tender new plants need to be able to get through. Hellebores blooms range from white to burgundy, and they start in January and continue through March. A bonus is that the dark green foliage will be beautiful all year.

James will also be speaking about edgeworthia, *Edgeworthia chrysantha*, which was introduced to the English garden by Michael Edgeworth in the early 1800's. The Japanese used it for high quality wallpaper, calligraphy, and bank notes which were almost impossible to forge. That is the history behind one of the common names, oriental paperbush. It also was valued by earlier generations for several medicinal purposes. The edgeworthia has a forest background and likes an acid soil; however, it will tolerate a neutral one as long as it is well drained and moist. The blooms have a sweet aroma, and the deciduous shrub will grow to 4-5 feet.

Another plant with a really sweet aroma is the winter daphne, *Daphne odoro*, but unlike the hellebores and the edgeworthia the winter daphne is not easy to grow. Walter Reeves and Erica Glasener wrote about the daphne in their book, Georgia Gardener's Guide. Walter recommends planting in the early spring with carefully amended soil. The daphne hates wet feet, so drainage is critical, and it is very finicky about fertilizer. Do not over fertilize. Mulch is vital, and Walter suggests that placing the daphne in a large pot, at least 16", might be an easier solution. In spite of the difficulties, the beauty and sweet aroma make the extra care worthwhile. Walter reminds us that on a cold February day, a single bloom from a winter daphne is enough to remind us that spring will come again.

These are only three of the plants that James Hembree will discuss at the regular monthly meeting of the Master Gardeners on February 11th. Anyone is welcome to attend to learn more about the interesting plants of winter. If you care to join us for dinner, bring a dish to share and show up by 6:00 pm. If you only want to attend the program, it will start by 7:00 pm. The gorgeous plants shown in the photos were photographed by WH Smith in his garden which is interesting at any season.

CCMG MEETING MINUTES, January 2016

Dorothy Rothbart called the meeting to order at 7:52 pm and welcomed David Huddleston with electric co-op as our guest. One item of news to be shared was that Lindsey Milikin resigned as the vice president, elect. The nominating committee put forth Nancy Dombrowsky as a new candidate. Nancy is a retired science teacher, and she did her master gardener training through the University of Pennsylvania. Lynn Jackson made a motion to accept Nancy as our vice president; Vicki Andryc seconded, and the motion carried.

Paula began the installation of the new officers; first she thanked the outgoing officers: Joyce McArthur, Margaret Hughes, Jackie Moon, and Joan Bagwell for their service. WH Smith and Joel Johnston were reminded of their duties as directors at large. They are to attend board meetings, and Paula gave them steel wool to put a shine on master gardener activities. David Wiener was given a tape measure to carefully gauge what he says as corresponding secretary. As recording secretary Phyllis King was given a trowel to plant what needs to be planted. Neville Brewer was given a fork to turn the budget items that need to be turned. As past president, Lynn Jackson was given a shovel because she knows where to dig. As president, Dorothy was given gloves because there are issues that need to be handled with care. Joyce McArthur made a motion that officers be accepted as presented; Patrick Dost seconded and the motion passed.

The treasurer's report was as follows: checking – \$36,711; money market – 11,330; cd – 10,041 with a total of \$58,082. New reports will be developed to show more precisely on a monthly basis exactly what has been spent. Michelle moved that we accept the report; Cherrie seconded. The motion carried. Everyone had been given a copy of the spreadsheet showing budget figures for 2015, actual money spent in 2015, and budget figures for 2016. After consideration, WH moved that we accept the budget as shown; Hilde seconded. The motion passed.

Paula discussed the training class for 2016; there are 21 trainees with 11 from Carroll and 10 from Douglas. Carroll is instituting a mentoring program, and Paula needs 4 more mentors. The class starts on 2/11 with a breakfast at 8:00 am. Everyone is urged to attend, but it would be especially important for chairs to meet the trainees to talk about the various programs. Mentors should help the trainees to find ways to complete their hours and help them to feel welcome. Paula expressed thanks to all who have helped to develop tests, schedules, and speakers.

Paula recognized several members; this year we had 90 members who logged 9866 hours. This was less than 2014. However, at \$23.07 per hour it would be worth \$227,480 or 5 full time employees. We had 20,924 personal contacts. We had 392,921 contacts for written contacts, emails, and telephone contacts. There were 37,514 travel miles recorded. There were 356 hours of advanced training recorded; however, we had only recorded 197 hours of continuing education. This is a number we expect to increase in 2016 because many of us were not aware of when or how it should be recorded. The continuing education hours are any time that we are being instructed.

Two members honored for having the most hours: Phyllis King – 783.5 and Grant McGukin – 644. The friend of master gardeners with the most hours in 2015 is Ken Ballenger with 68. 500 hour ribbons were presented to Bob Chriss, Jack Garvin, Katie Deems, Alyson Stober. 1000 hour ribbons were presented to Angela Chriss, Lynn Jackson, Phyllis King, Joyce McArthur, Dorothy Rothbart, Susan Thomas, Jackie Moon, and Fred Hickson. Kathy Howell received a 2000 hour ribbon; Grant McGukin has a 3000 hour ribbon. WH Smith and Wendell Holmes both have 4000 hour ribbons.

Five year awards were presented to Jim Langham, Katy Lazar, Joyce McArthur, Tee Davis, Margaret

Hughes, Hilde Wolverton, Debra Gammons, Kitty Barr, Laura Davis, and Tee Davis. Ten year ribbons were awarded to Susan Thomas, Suzanne Wall, Judy Anderson, Jan Johnson. 15 year awards were given to Nancy Disinger, WH Smith, and Janet Kiczek.

Silver Stars were awarded to those who have completed 5 advanced trainings: Jack Garvin, Dorothy Rothbart, Vicki Lloyd, Susan Thomas, and Tee Davis.

Paula thanked the education committee for holding helpful workshops to educate the public; this allows Paula to do other things. It is also with great thanks that Paula reported that Jane Kingsley is retiring from the Friday afternoon slot in the office after 15 wonderful years. That slot is now open for someone. Paula also thanked Lynn Jackson for her year as president of the organization; she has shown great leadership and organization. We are off to a good start at logging hours in 2016 with 90 being reported already.

Perfect attendance awards were given to Joel Johnston, Dorothy Rothbart, Lynn Jackson, and Phyllis King.

Michelle Lewis needs help from master gardeners who enjoy working with young people; she will be working with Youth Connection to renew the youth gardening that she does on Saturdays. She has been doing this since 2012, and some of the young people have returned to work as mentors for younger teens. The project was on hold last year because there was not anyone from Youth Connection to oversee the project. February 5th will be the first planning date for the new year. In order to fund the project, Michelle is sponsoring a contra dance this Saturday at 6:00 pm. This is like a modern square dance and as much fun as anyone can have for \$5.00; it will get this project off to a good start. Instructions will be given to newbies.

Tommie Munroe, our NW District 2 director, spoke to the group about joining GMGA the state organization. This group had their first board meeting for 2016 today, and they are off to an exciting year with many activities. Joyce McArthur is the GMGA Vice President of Education and has been working to show the advantages of being a member of GMGA. For those members who have recently joined, Joyce held a drawing for a car license holder; Debra Gammons won that.

The first field trip for GMGA is February 17th with a trip to Massee Lane Gardens. This will be a tour of the gardens and a box lunch for \$15.00. Joyce will send out an email closer to the time. Money will be collected before the date or even on the day.

WH Smith is the executive chair of the state conference being planned for September 30th and October 1st. It is the very early stages, but there is a great team working on it. Dorothy Rothbart, Lynn Jackson, Joyce McArthur, Nancy Dombrowsky, Neville Brewer, Margaret Hughes, and Phyllis King are some of the chairs and co-chairs. A tentative budget has been set, and the early plans have been made for facilities. Most activities will be at the Cultural Arts Center and the Marriott Hotel.

The program committee will have its first meeting tomorrow, 1/22 at 9:30, and Dot Martin, the state president of GMGA will attend our next executive meeting on Wednesday the 27th at 1:00 at the Cultural Arts Center.

The hospitality co-chairs, Cherry Glover and Phyllis King, thanked Kim Littleton for her service in 2015 and announced that we will use the same plan of everyone helping the month after their birthdays. All the January birthdays will help at the February meeting. Thanks to the November and December birthdays who helped tonight.

Vicki Andryc thanked those who helped with the 2015 Christmas Party and asked by a show of hands who all liked the location, food, and program. Most everybody seemed satisfied; Vicki will announce a planning meeting to start working on 2016 soon. Anyone interested is urged to attend. Susan Thomas announced that the 2016 Directory will be electronic as the board approved. However, if

anyone has any changes in status, please let Susan know, so she can update the system. If you have not

paid your dues, please do so asap. Richard Littleton suggested that we add a field to show special interest of our members. This would be very helpful in planning programs.

If you have pots to donate for the plant sale, please hold on to them a little while longer. We cannot get to the barn at this time, and Paula needs to complete a couple of livestock shows before she can reserve a spot in the stalls for that purpose. James Hembree will be donating pots for us when we have space for them. We have some new vendors who have small plants that are reasonable in price, but we will need to grow them for a year for them to be viable. It seems that the native azalea market has been saturated, and we need to develop other plants to sell.

Burson's, Everything Outdoors, and Southern States have all donated seeds to the Seed Saver project. Carol needs more prescription bottles and silica packets. PLEASE remove personal information before donating the bottles. She is developing a notebook containing empty seed packets so the seed borrower can read about the seeds they are taking. It will be stored on top of the seed cabinet for public use. She does not need any more glass bottles such as baby food jars. Carol also told us that the rain has washed away much of what had been planted on the trail. Georgia Wildlife Federation has made a big donation of plants to be used. As soon as the weather will cooperate a workday will be scheduled. On 2/16 the Native Plant Society will have Giff Beaton to speak on dragon flies and damselflies. The Native Plant group meets the third Tuesday of the even numbered months: February, April, June, August, and November. Also, there is a conference on 2/20 at the Georgia Perimeter College at the Decatur Campus off Panthersville Road; it is the 21st Native Plant Symposium and will run from 8 am – 3:45 pm. Presentations include: Ephemerals, Gardening with Stormwater, New and Unusual plants of the Southeast. Workshops on plant photography and plant illustration will be held after lunch.

The newsletter will have information about the new programs for Junior Master Gardeners; also, the Rebecca Martin Garden Club is donating funds to this group for the next few months.
