Project Achievement - Part 1

Choosing a Topic & Note Taking





Project Achievement is your opportunity to express your individuality and share what interests you with your peers and leaders. In our December Club Meetings, you will have the opportunity to share your demonstration with your class. Project Achievement for many is the experience of the year and we strongly encourage all to participate in the County and District Competitions!

Read the paragraph below from a sample 4-H speech about chicken eggs. Look at the underlined information. This is the most important information. Rewrite the information in your own words in the evaluate/communicate section.

Fully formed, the chicken egg has many parts. The ^{1.} <u>outside</u> of the egg is a shell made up of a mineral called calcite. The shell protects the egg. It keeps out bacteria and other harmful things. ^{2.} When a chick is forming, the shell will let oxygen in and carbon dioxide out. In fresh eggs, the ^{3.} <u>shell is coated by a waxy substance called the cuticle that helps to seal it</u>. This is washed away from the eggs you buy in the store.
