EFNEP—Teaching Nutrition One Food Demonstration at a Time

Bibb County Cooperative Extension has one goal in mind: to provide Bibb County families with nutrition education for eating healthy on a budget. A lofty goal – however, Bibb County Cooperative Extension Program Assistants Alesia Mays and Charlene May are up to the challenge! The "dynamic duo," as we like to call them, conduct Expanded Food & Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) nutrition education classes in-person or at a distance for both adults and youth audiences.

Are you or someone you know interested in improving your family's health, saving money at the store, and learning basic nutrition tips? Well, we have the resources to assist in this endeavor!

The purpose and mission of the EFNEP program is to reach out to limited-resource families with young children and provide food and nutrition education, using hands-on experiences in a small group setting. Participants attend an eight-lesson series for adults or a six-lesson series for youth, which focuses on stretching food dollars, improving eating habits, and managing food budgets, food preparation, and food safety principles.

Got Spots?

Autumn is the time of year when the Extension office receives calls about leaf spots on hydrangeas. Because of constant leaf wetness from late summer rains, diseased foliage on *Hydrangea macrophylla* made an early appearance this year. Foliar diseases, like those pictured, spread by leaf wetness. While they can usually be minimized by assuring that landscape irrigation will not spray the foliage, nothing can be done about rainy weather. **Preventative** fungicide applications can help to control these spots, but no fungicide will "fix" these leaves after they have been infected. The best strategy now is good sanitation: rake and destroy the diseased leaves after they fall, along with old mulch, and apply fresh mulch to prevent overwintering of the disease that may affect the new foliage next spring.

Power Outage Preparedness

Life is unpredictable. In the last month alone, I have experienced two power outages and several power surges. Thankfully, I was somewhat prepared. I also found areas where I needed improvement. Here are a few tips to assist you in case of a power outage.

- * Add the telephone number or app for your utility company to your phone. This is helpful when reporting outages.
- * Prepare a power outage kit. It should include glow light sticks, flashlights, a battery-powered radio, extra batteries, and a wind-up clock.
- * Install carbon monoxide detectors with battery backup in central locations on every level of your home.
- * Keep a thermometer in the refrigerator and freezer.

In the Event of a Power Outage:

- Operate portable generators outside, away from flammable materials, children, and pets.
- * Connect lights and appliances directly to a generator, not to an existing electrical system.
- * Disconnect appliances and electronics to avoid damage from electrical surges.
- * Leave one light switch in the on-position to alert you when service is restored.
- * Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed. If the door remains closed, a fully-loaded freezer can keep foods frozen for two days. - * If the temperature in the refrigerator is 40 degrees or higher, then you should dispose of the food. For guidance on when to discard food after a power outage, refer to the USDA food safety guide at https://www.foodsafety.gov/foodsafety-charts/food-safety-during-power-outage.
