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#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Have you tried something new in your garden this year? I've been reading about pollinators and companion planting and decided to try that in my raised bed vegetable garden. With a few exceptions, it seems to be working out great! I planted basil, borage, zinnia, marigold and anise hyssop alongside all my vegetables and wow! I've noticed an exponential increase in pollinator activity, along with a decrease in insect pest and disease activity. The outliers are my cucumber plants, so I am going to have to do some further research about why they are having a disappointing showing.

But that's what gardening and life are all about, right? That new idea, plant design or technique might be a spectacular success or a dismal failure or something in-between. Regardless of the outcome, you've gleaned new insights that will come in handy in the future.

What about trying something new as a volunteer? Our group has so many opportunities to dip your toes into and learn. Here are a few things that you might consider:

\*Volunteer to record or edit a Backyard Association (BYA) meeting, volunteer meeting and/or a continuing education presentation. These presentations can then be shared with our group and to the public. You don't need to be a technological genius!

\*Take a shift at the "in-person help desk" and I guarantee that you will learn something new. You don't have to be a plant or insect ID expert or know the genus and species of every plant. You just have to be willing to research problems for your neighbors in Coweta County and do a little bit of prevolunteer shift training.

\*Show up at a Nature Trail workday and learn about native plants and invasives. The trails are a beautiful place to spend some time and weeding is very therapeutic.

Don't forget about our upcoming volunteer meeting on July 13th, at 10 AM in the DMMR. This is your chance to catch up on everything happening in the group and socialize with your fellow MGEVs. I look forward to seeing everyone there.



#### **CONTINUING EDUCATION REVIEW**





I tuned into the June 8th Thoughtful Thursday for continuing education. "Resources for Your MGEV Adventure" provided a review of information sources for MGEVs. Sheri Dorn and her assistant Sarah Sawyer, from the state office, outlined the Georgia MGEV program website. It contains information on upcoming events, advanced training, Trellis blog and Extension publications. If you don't receive Trellis, you can sign up to receive it there. It also provides connections to Facebook and Instagram pages.

Everyone is familiar with MGLOG, but I bet you were unaware of all its various features. Sheri and Sarah reviewed the homepage and gave navigation tips. In the MGEV Profile tab, you can change your email or home address, phone number or update other parts of your profile. This summer the Risk Management Training (RMT) section will prompt you when to update your training. The homepage shows a "Top Ten List" of the total number of hours accrued by county. It also shows the average hours by MGEV. Coweta leads the state with average number of volunteer hours per MGEV. Of interest to Committee Chairs, there is a report which totals hours recorded by project and time intervals. This session is 30 minutes long and can be found at Thoughtful Thursday on the MGLOG homepage

#### **JULY IN THE GARDEN**

- -Observe your garden in the morning and at dusk. Keep an eye out for pests and diseases. Least harmful early intervention in the best.
- -Cut back herbs like basil, mint, and oregano by half to prevent them from producing seeds and to promote more fragrant leaves.
- -Take time to do a "tick check" after working in the yard.
- -Continue to plant annual seeds such as marigolds, cosmos, and sunflowers.
- -Support tall flower stems prone to fall over after a rain.

# PRUNING HINTS FROM CR

ANNUALS: Continuing deadheading annual flowers.

BULBS: Remove dead flowers from daylilies and dahlias or just have the deer nibble them off.

EDIBLES: Prune figs lightly removing tall shoots from the middle of the bush. Remove vertical water sprouts from apple, peach, and pear limbs.

HOUSEPLANTS: Care MUST be taken when pruning house plants as some have sap that will irritate your skin and eyes! That's why you should ALWAYS thoroughly wash your hands after handling these plants. Houseplants known to have irritating sap are dieffenbachia, poinsettia, philodendron, pothos, and weeping fig.

LAWNS: *Grasscycling* is the practice of leaving your grass clippings on the lawn rather than bagging them. This practice saves time, fuel, and adds nitrogen back into the soil, reducing the amount of fertilizer required. Most new mowers have a 'mulching' setting that accomplishes this effort. Now is the time to raise the height of your mower blade another notch. With the higher heat our lawns are experiencing, this will give the roots a chance to actually provide sufficient nutrients so the grass can grow.

PERENNIALS and ORNAMENTAL GRASSES: Prune back by 1/3 to 1/2 fall blooming perennials like asters, chrysanthemums, helianthus, heliopsis. This will result in fuller plants that shouldn't require staking. Continue to deadhead repeat bloomers as this will encourage more blooms.

ROSES: Prune weak or dead limbs every time you examine your roses. Don't forget to periodically sterilize your pruners so as not to spread disease.

SHRUBS: Remove dead branches and flowers once they finish blooming. Prune fast growing species like privet, abelia, laurel, and holly as this will neaten them up and they will still have time to harden off before winter. Dead heading your butterfly bushes will encourage more blooms until frost.

TREES: There is still time to prune trees that bloomed in the spring. Cut off seed pods and prune lightly to shape the trees. Prune summer flowering trees as soon as they finish blooming, if pruning is needed at all.

VINES and GROUND COVERS: If you have English ivy or Virginia creeper growing on a wall or around doors or windows and it threatens to cover the doors or windows, cut it back now! As always, many thanks to Reeves & Glasener in their Month-by-Month GARDENING in GEORGIA.'

We have items to do that are for all skill and knowledge levels. Please join us! We would love to see your pretty and handsome faces!!










