The Granroos Garden-Landscaping with Structure and Beauty

We built our house in 1977 having moved from Massachusetts, Over the years our backyard has been a neighbor baseball field, go cart race track and firecracker launch site.

Our first landscaping was hit or miss. The generosity of friends and digging at old abandoned home places was our introduction to Georgia landscaping. The flowering pear tree (Bradford) was the focal point of our first landscaping design along with dogwoods and crepe myrtles and became one of our favorites. My gardening mentor and friend, Marian Seals, inspired my gardening interest and encouraged me to become a Master Gardener.

The backyard is on an easement over several gas lines that run from Houston to the Northeast and has both positive and negative restrictions. The summer of the Olympics (1996) the pipes were dug up and replaced. Oh, what a mess but there was a silver lining. We used this as an opportunity to have a "real" landscape design. All the shrubs and plantings had to be approved by the pipeline company. We wanted to have some bushes or shrubs flowering all the time The landscape was planted as designed and we were most happy.

However, I never met a plant I didn't love. It's kind of like going to a candy store as a kid. Orphan plants were always welcomed. I soon had to follow the rule that if I couldn't plant it the day, I brought it home then I shouldn't bring it home- but rules can be broken. Our plant list attests to that. Our backyard matured as our kids and grandkids did, and soon became the background for prom, birthday and Christmas card pictures. We also have a passion for traveling, sometimes weeks at a time, and so we shifted into planting more perennials than annuals. We use annuals in pots for interest and added colors.

As you tour the garden you will notice an abundance of wildlife. We enjoy watching deer, wild turkeys, birds and other animals that visit. The deer feeder has protected our backyard for years as long as the feeder goes off at 7 am and 7 pm our plants are safe. The yard landscape features a fish pond with a water fall, dry stream beds, mirrored planting areas, numerous bird houses, statues and a picnic area with a chiminea covered by a canopy, several sitting areas which allow us to enjoy the seasonal plantings along with the manicured surrounds. We have three small tiered areas for vegetables and herbs.

My other passion is cooking and we host numerous BBQ's during the year with the garden as a beautiful venue.
