We are still somewhat in shock over the loss of about 130 pine trees due to the infestation of pine beetles. There are still more dead trees that will likely need to be removed in the future. It will take some time to finish the clean-up and see what has survived and what we will discover that was not apparent prior to the disturbance.

On a positive note, we have had several really good workdays and great participation from the 2024 class. We have been working on the Red Trail so that it will be in good shape in time for the June Garden Tour of the Inspiration Garden. There is still a lot of work to be done and we could use your help on May 6<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>, from 9:00 am – 11:00 am. We are at a loss when trying to plan projects to pursue when we never know how many workers to anticipate. Please let us know if you plan to be a somewhat regular volunteer at the Nature Trails. We have a volunteer ready to adopt the fern areas, learn more about ferns, and work to maintain and enhance the areas. We have several areas started for pollinators that will be more viable with more sunlight due to the removal of the pines. If that is an interest of yours, we would love to have you adopt an area, maintain it, and further develop it. At one time, we had an inventory of plants, but that is far out of date, especially where the pines were removed and the whole area disturbed. We could use someone that would like to inventory the plants and create an updated data base. Another suggestion is to create a handout to let visitors know what plants are at the center and when to see them at their best. Perhaps you have other thoughts or interests. We would love to hear your ideas.

# BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB "I Can Garden Club"





On March 27 Pat Farmer delivered a program called "Reading the Tree Rings" to the children. Everyone got to count tree rings and look for woodpecker holes in the tree bark. On April 24 the MGEVs led the children on a hike on the RED trail and to the Inspiration Garden.

## WHAT'S AN EPHEMERAL?

Ephemeral, in botany, is any short-lived plant, usually one that has one or more generations per year, growing only during favorable periods (as when adequate moisture is available) and passing the unfavorable periods in the form of seeds. They usually arrive in early spring and disappear in a few weeks. Ephemeral's make a wonderful addition to a shade or rock garden.



## **MAY IN THE GARDEN**

- Plant summer blooming bulbs. Bulbs need warm soils that are at least 70 degrees.
- Select pollinator plants and native plants which attract butterflies and bees.
- Water as needed according to county guidelines. Provide at least 1 inch of water per week during dry periods. Use drip or soaker hoses rather than watering overhead. Vegetables in raised beds may need water 2-3 times per week for moisture to penetrate the soil 4-5 inches down.
- Manage weeds while they are young by cultivation and mulching.
- Harmful insects become more active during warm weather, but not all insects are bad. Become familiar with the good and the bad and leave the good ones alone.

## PRUNING HINTS FROM CR

<u>Annuals:</u> Warmer temps will make your pansies wilt, so pull them out and replace them with petunias, marigolds, coleus, geraniums, and other colorful annuals.

<u>Bulbs:</u> Just keep plants groomed. To prevent disease from spreading, remove dead or funky looking leaves.

<u>Edibles:</u> Healthy fruit trees produce more young fruit than the tree can easily bear, so surplus fruit should be thinned out by spacing adjacent fruit on each limb: peach - 8", apple - 6", plum - 6", and pear - 8".

**Houseplants:** Regularly remove dead leaves as they occur.

<u>Lawns:</u> As the summer mowing season starts in earnest, make sure your mower has been properly serviced, the blade sharpened, and set to the correct height, cutting no more than a third of the height of the grass to be mowed.

<u>Perennials and Ornamental Grasses:</u> Deadheading spent blossoms will encourage the production of new flowers. Cut fall blooming chrysanthemums and asters by 1/3 for fuller plants in the fall. Cutting back some plants will delay blooming. Experiment, and if you have several of the same type this might be a way to enjoy flowers over a longer time.

<u>Roses:</u> DO NOT let faded blossoms remain on your roses. Remove and discard them regularly. <u>Shrubs:</u> Prune your flowering shrubs after they've spent their last flowers, especially azaleas, rhododendrons, and viburnum. Be vigilant to remove spent blossoms before they set seeds as that will result in more vigorous growth where the plant is putting its energy into forming next year's blooms and new growth instead of seeds.

<u>Trees:</u> Remove dead or diseased leaves and limbs. DO NOT put diseased plant parts into your compost pile as this may spread the problem on down the line to new plantings! Bag these diseased parts and put them out with the trash.

<u>Vines and Ground Covers:</u> Make sure your vining plants are tied in place - not too tightly - just where they are supposed to be. Concerning wisteria, it's an aggressive vine so cut back the long twinging new growth after it blooms or you'll have a tangled mess.
