• **Education:** Cathy LeBar reported:

The Educational component after the Volunteer meeting will be a review of the gardening tips we got from the "Tip Jar" at our last meeting and a discussion on Yarrow – with some yummy Yarrow snacks.

• Speakers Bureau: (Patty Ellis reports the following)

Dale Senko did a presentation on Herbs 101 at the Newnan Carnegie on May 7th at 11am. There were 36 attendees and they got a free herb plant or packet of herb seeds.

Extension Landscape: Cathy LeBar reported:

Landscape Extension Team is in full swing with approximately 5 or so members from the new class joining the existing team of 3-4 rather regularly for their workdays. They have been hard at work on a shade garden along the fence using accent boulders as well with the help of County officers.

• Ext. Support/MGEV Help Desk: Patty Ellis reported the following:

We've had a few folks from the new class express interest in working the help desk and they are doing training to get started. Everything else continues as usual.

• <u>Fundraising:</u> Committee inactive at this time. Will reactivate should the need arise. Melanie Landrum reports the following for our Soil3 sales:

\$885 for the first quarter, plus an additional \$480 earned at the Spring Plant Sale for a total of \$1,365!!!

- Garden Tour: Nothing to report no Tour planned until 2026
- Greenhouse: Barb Schwartz reported the following:

After a very successful workday last week, the team cleaned and disinfected hundreds of empty pots of various sizes. All accumulated pots have been stored in the shed. We are now ready to start taking in more empty BLACK pots. We are looking for the pots from plant sale purchases - particularly 2 and 3 gallon pots. Black pots only. They can be left on the table outside the shed. We'll schedule another pot scrubbing day sometime in May.

Shade cloth is on the greenhouse. Plants we are currently tending to in the greenhouse stand a better chance of surviving and not being cooked. Heat will not go on unless temp is below 50.

All coleus plants have been moved outside to the shade area.

All plants that need to be in the shade have been moved. Plants needing sun have also been moved. We will be scheduling "digs" and subsequent potting in May as soon as we find out what is available and what can be used for the FPS.

We anticipate that hardwoods will be ready to be transported sometime within the first two weeks of June. Date TBD.

Daily watering continues (as required) for all plants.

Hospitality: Amy Sharpe reported the following:

A big thank you to everyone that helped clean the food booth (before AND after the sale), shop, prepare, loan their crock pots, and serve lunches for the SPS.

We have a sign-up sheet for our upcoming BYA's, Morning Glories, etc. – all the help we have been getting is greatly appreciated.

• Inspiration Garden (formerly known as Demonstration Garden):

Kathy Olmsted & Amy Keller reported the following:

We are busy preparing the IG for our Open Garden Day on June 1st. Beds and paths have been weeded - an ongoing task, veggies have been planted, perennials have been trimmed and a few new annuals have been added. We potted 50 plants to be given as gifts for our visitors. We've received Stephanie's approval for the great signage that was created by Deborah so we can move forward to have a sign printed. The county will not have the funds for our new sign until 2025. We've had several members of the new class participate in our work days which has been fun and a great way to get to know them.

We will be hosting the Boys & Girls Club on May 24th.

Nature Trail: Ed Atkinson reported the following:

We are still somewhat in shock over the loss of about 130 pine trees due to the infestation of pine beetles. There are still more dead trees that will likely need to be removed in the future. It will take some time to finish the clean-up and see what has survived and what we will discover that was not apparent prior to the disturbance.

On a positive note, we have had several really good workdays and great participation from the 2024 class. We have been working on the Red Trail so that it will be in good shape in time for the June Garden Tour of the Inspiration Garden. There is still a lot of work to be done and we could use your help on May 6th and 20th, from 9:00 – 11:00. We are at a loss when trying to plan projects to pursue when we never know how many workers to anticipate. Please let us know if you plan to be a somewhat regular volunteer at the Nature Trails. We have a volunteer ready to adopt the fern areas, learn more about ferns, and work to maintain and enhance the areas. We have several areas started for pollinators that will be more viable with more sunlight due to the removal of the pines. If that is an interest of yours, we would love to have you adopt the areas, maintain and further develop them. At one time, we had an inventory of plants, but that is far out of date, especially where the pines were removed and the whole area disturbed. We could use someone that would like to inventory the plants and create/update a data base. Another suggestion was to create a handout to let visitors know what plants are at the center and when to see them at their best. Perhaps you have other thoughts or interests and we would love to hear them and explore them to make the trails even better than they have ever been.
