Why winter damage is showing up now

If you are seeing plants with individual branch death, top dieback, or are slow to leaf out and grow, the problem is most likely freeze-damage. Some plants were killed entirely or were killed to the ground, resulting in new growth developing from the crown (such as with hydrangeas). Boxwoods have been hit particularly hard.

There is damage across all the boxwood in the field planting; however, some plants are showing more damage than others. The amount of damage just has to do with what stage of growth was present at the time of the freeze event. Those that were growing well and flushing new growth were most damaged. Those not showing as much damage now are actually more stressed and slower growing plants. Their growth developed after the freeze event. (Cont. Page 3)









<u>CAES researchers find improved treatments</u> <u>for removing 'forever chemicals'</u>

University of Georgia researchers in the College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences and the College of Engineering are wrapping up the final year of a study to develop improved, cost-effective treatment systems with advanced technologies for removing polyfluoroalkyl and perfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) from water, wastewater and biosolids.

Dubbed "forever chemicals," PFAS are a group of manufactured chemicals developed in the late 1930s that have been widely used in industry and consumer products due to their fire-resistant properties and ability to repel oil and water. The team was awarded nearly \$1.6 million through a congressionally mandated grant from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to mitigate PFAS, which take a long time to break down and can build up in people, animals, water and soil over time. PFAS are commonly found in paper food packaging, stain-resistant and waterproof clothing and furniture, fire-repellants, and nonstick cookware.



Winter Damage continued

Freeze damaged tissues often appear light-colored and bleached; however, on other plant species, damaged tissues will be brown or black and shriveled. In some cases, cambial damage may have occurred that is preventing water and nutrient translocation in the plant. This is where

you may see poor growth and branch or top dieback. At this point, if you see trees and woody shrubs not doing well, showing branch dieback, having exploded/sloughing bark or vertical cracking on trunks, look to see if it is mostly on the western to southern exposure and assume it is due to freeze damage. There isn't anything that can be done other than prune off the dead tissues but wait until axillary buds start to break before heavy pruning.

Many boxwoods are showing extensive dieback or where one to several branches are browning and dying. Most is cold damage, but some could be due to Volutella blight or Colletotrichum dieback. Both of these diseases are due to mostly secondary pathogens that infect weakened, often root disease affected, plants and cause small cankers on the stems that kills the foliage above it. There is no control for these diseases other than pruning out affected/dead branches and trying to alleviate plant stress. Fungicides may or may not help, and mostly won't because the main problem is due to root issues, so they are generally not recommended. Look for black stem lesions, leaf spotting, and defoliation on affected parts of the plant to identify boxwood blight.

Tips on asking for advice from your Extension Service

Take pictures – clear pictures of the whole plant, the affected leaves (top and bottom), stems, fruit, and of any bugs or eggs you see

Have information ready – When was it planted? How long has the problem been present? Have you tried any kind of treatment already? Are other plants having the same issues?

Bring in a sample – We are happy to try and diagnose problems in our office (Free). However, for some problems, samples are sent to the UGA Plant Pathology Lab (\$14)
Samples should be in an enclosed bag or container and include damaged plant

parts and any insects that were on it


