Starting a Garden From Scratch

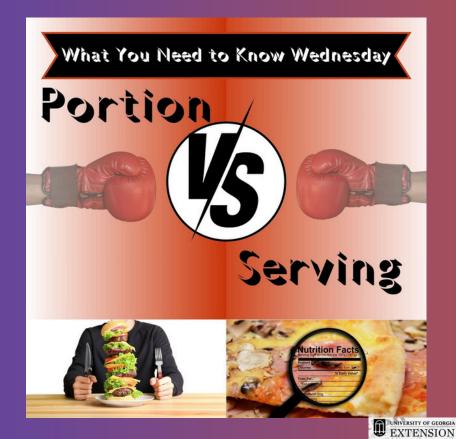


Gardening Calendar June

- Harvest vegetables such as beans, peas, squash, cucumbers, and okra regularly to prolong production and enjoy peak freshness.
- Eat "high on the hog" in June and July and preserve enough to last during the winter months ahead.
- For best results, harvest onions and Irish potatoes when two thirds of the tops have died down. Store potatoes in a cool, dark place and onions in a dry, airy place.
- Clean off rows of early crops as soon as they are through bearing and use rows for replanting or keep them fallow for fall crops.
- Water as needed.
- Plant sweet potatoes and a second planting of Southern peas.



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Did You Know?

- Serving Size- Standardized amount of food listed on product's Nutrition facts label.
- Portion- The amount of food that you choose to eat at one time; which may be more or less than a serving. A portion is 100% under your control.
- Many foods that come as a single portion contain multiple servings.
- Eating out? Some meals have portions that are enough for two or more people.

Tips on asking for advice from your Extension Service

<u>Take pictures</u> – clear pictures of the whole plant, the affected leaves (top and bottom), stems, fruit, and of any bugs or eggs you see

Have information ready - When was it planted? How long has the problem been present? Have you tried any kind of treatment already? Are other plants having the same issues?

Bring in a sample - We are happy to try and diagnose problems in our office (Free). However, for some problems, samples are sent to the UGA Plant
Pathology Lab (\$14)

Samples should be in an enclosed bag or container, with a paper towel, and include leaves, stems, roots, flowers/fruit, and any insects that were found on it.
