University of Georgia Cooperative Extension offers programming focused on mental health, financial well-being, nutrition and everything in between. Extension had 1,652,159 in-person contacts in 2022. Of these, 187,835 contacts addressed health and wellness topics, and 141,401 related to urban agriculture.

The Agricultural and Environmental Sciences Agent began a research trial to increase higher conception rates at the time of breeding.
